PRESENTER

Honorable Paul G. Cassell, professor of law, received a B.A. (1981) and a J.D. (1984) from Stanford University, where he graduated Order of the Coif and was president of the "Stanford Law Review". He clerked for then-Judge Antonin Scalia when Judge Scalia was on the D.C. Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals, and subsequently clerked for the Chief Justice of the United States, Warren Burger, before becoming an associate deputy attorney general with the U.S. Justice Department. Before joining the S.J. Quinney College of Law, Professor Cassell was an assistant U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia. He was sworn in as a U.S. District Court judge for the District of Utah on July 2, 2002. He has written extensively on victims' rights and is the co-author (with NCVLI's Executive Director Douglas Beloof) of "The Victim's Right to Attend Trials: The Re-Emerging Consensus," 9 LEWIS & CLARK L. REV. 481 (2005).
